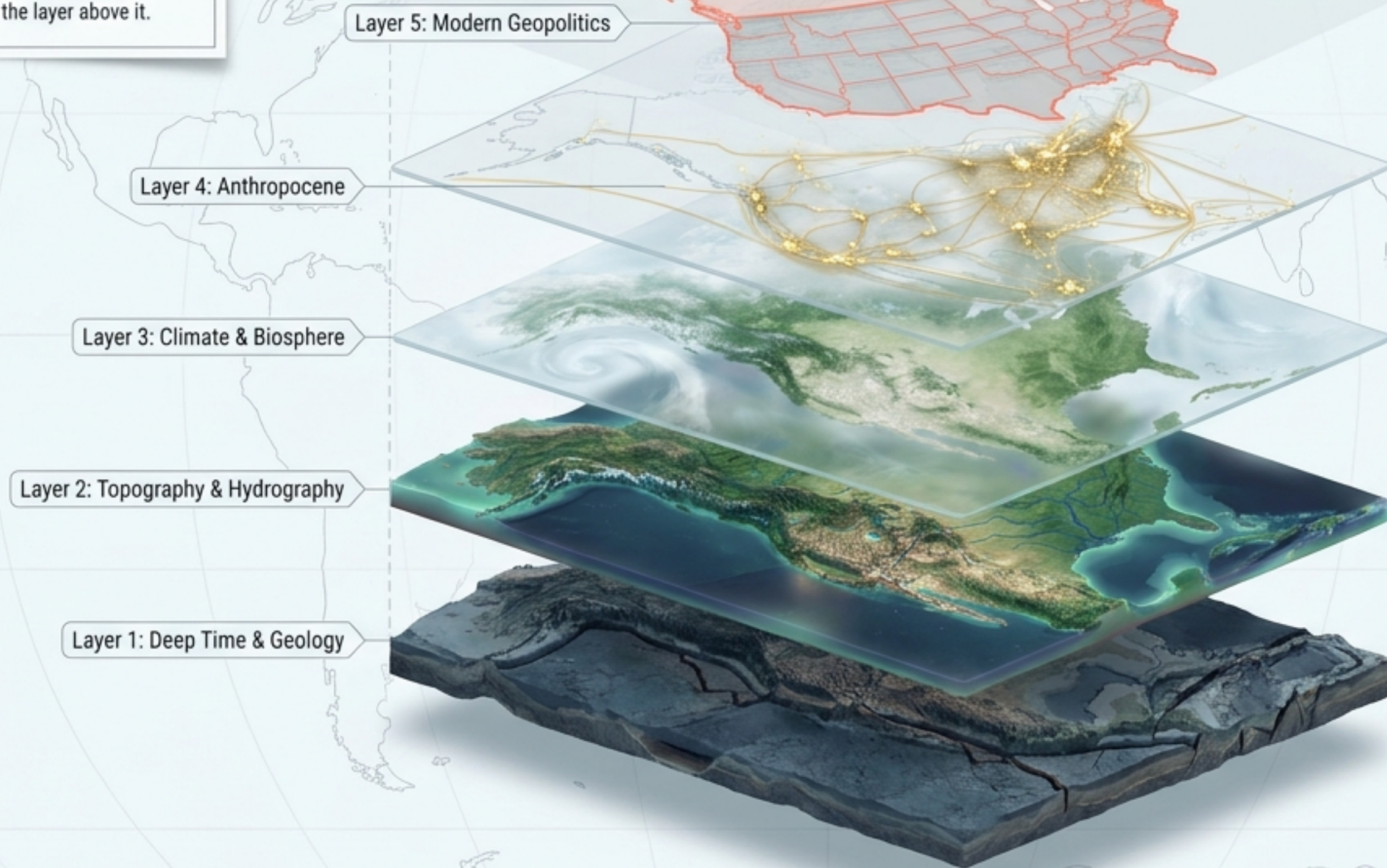

North America's current geopolitical reality is simply the uppermost layer of a story that began 4 billion years ago.

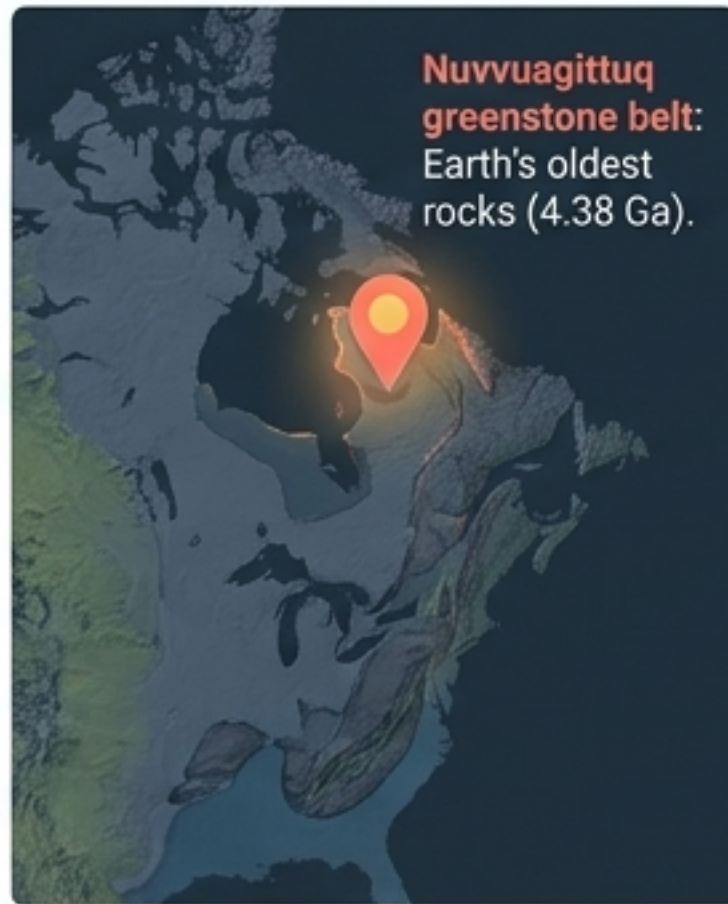
To understand the continent, we must analyze it as a stacked system where every layer dictates the behavior of the layer above it.

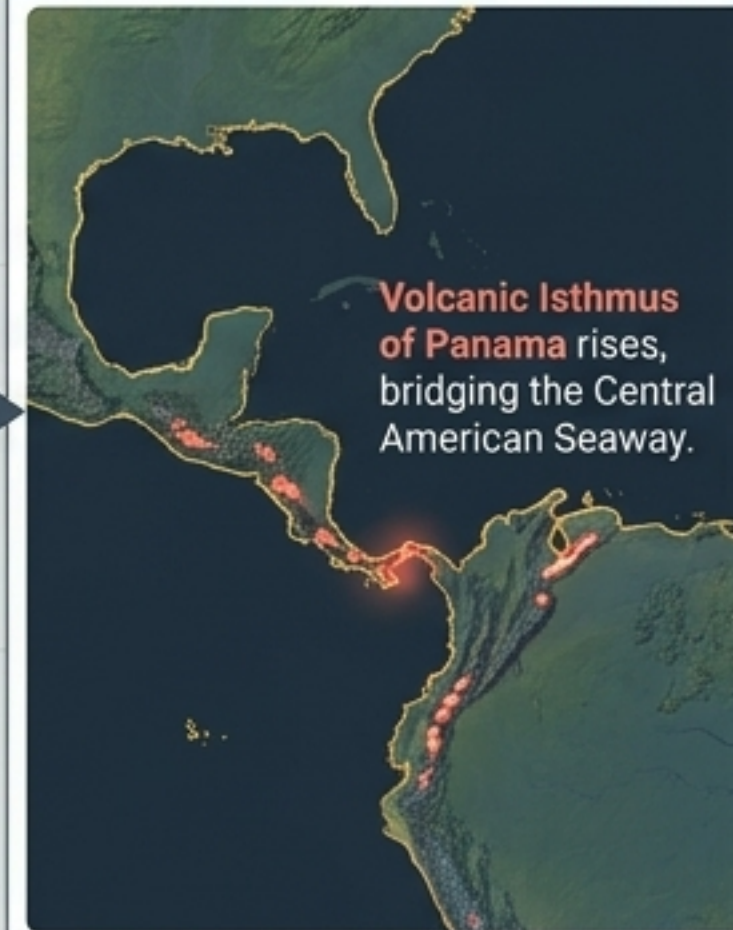

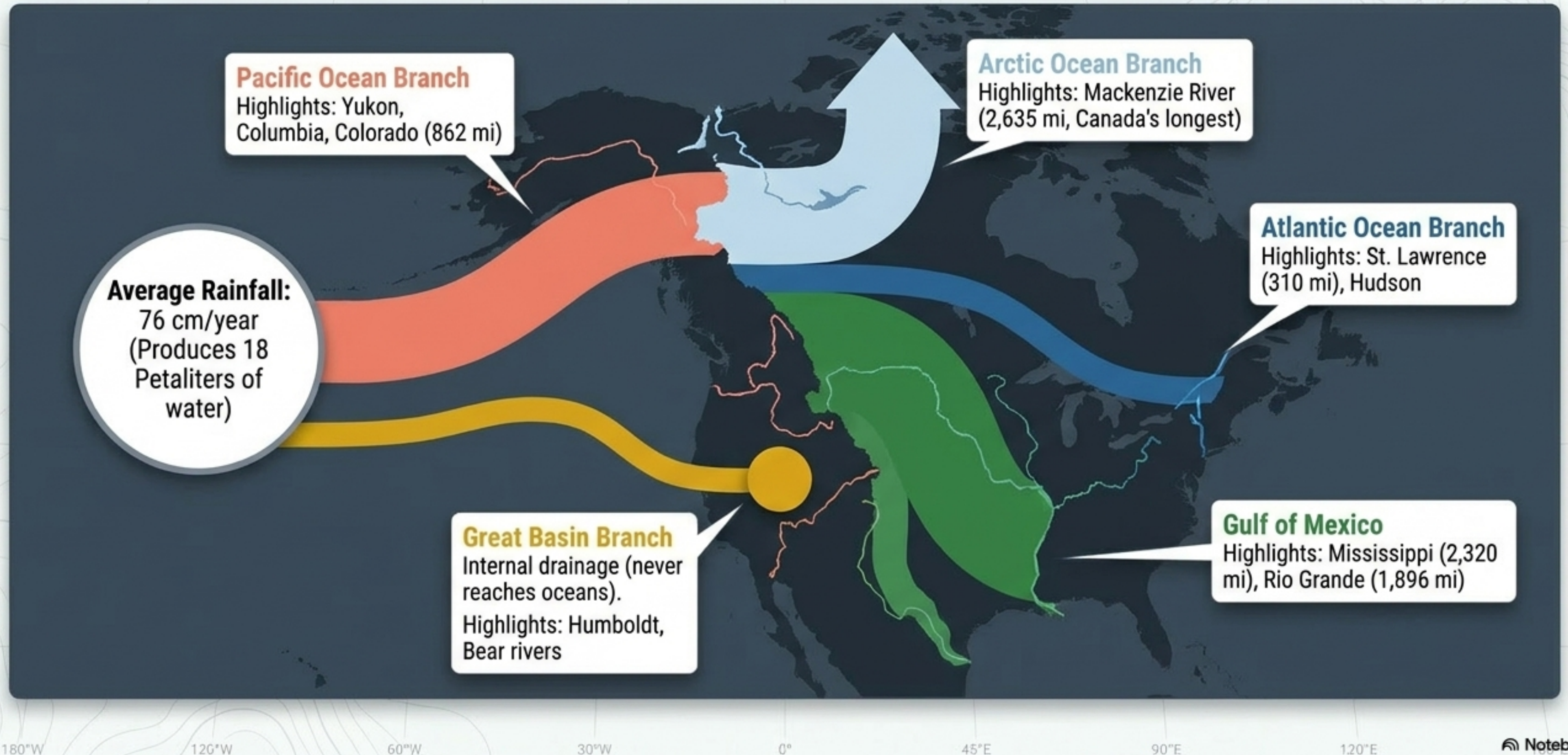

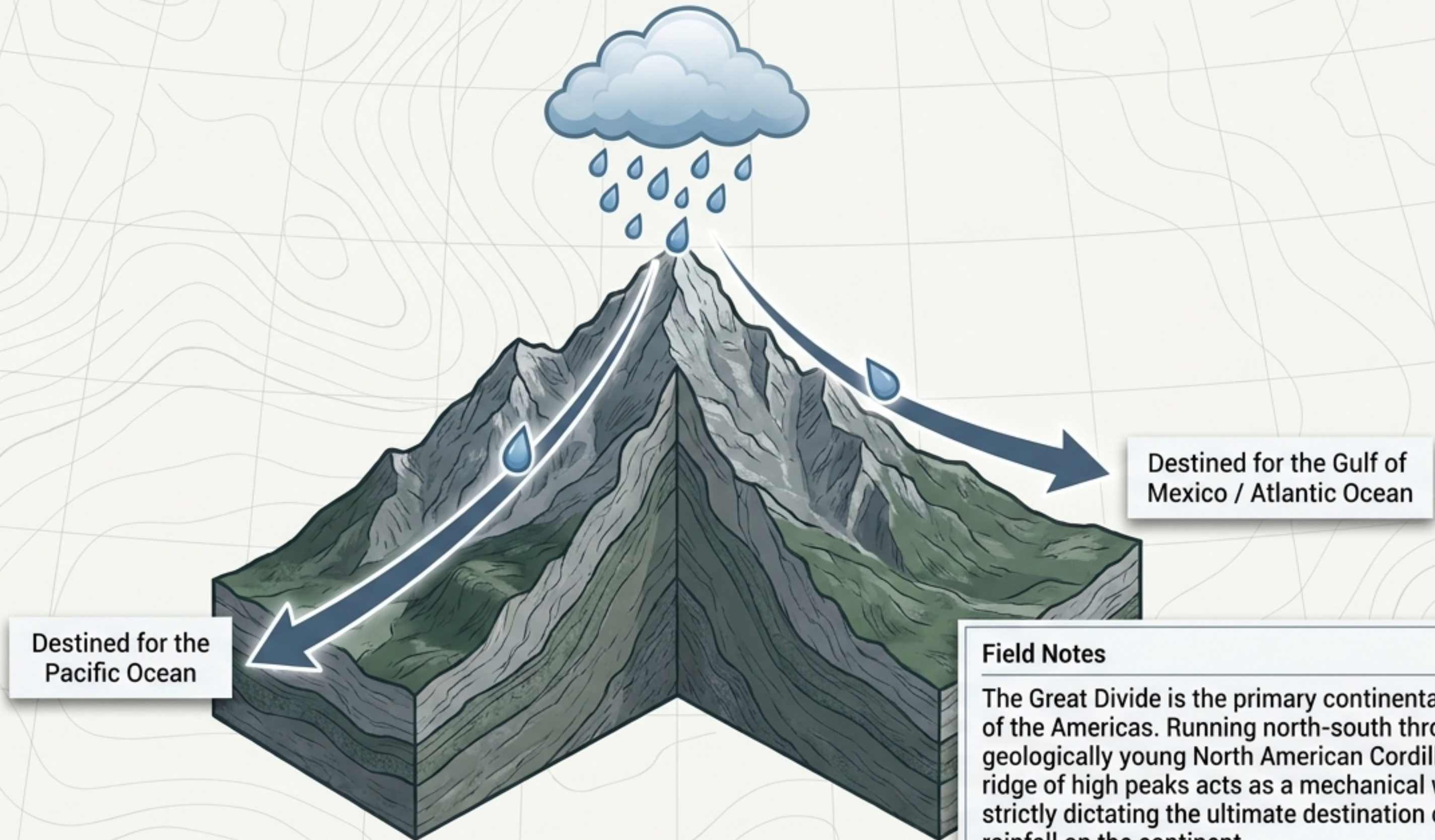

The Continental Divide Mechanic



Field Notes

The Great Divide is the primary continental divide of the Americas. Running north-south through the geologically young North American Cordillera, this ridge of high peaks acts as a mechanical wedge, strictly dictating the ultimate destination of all rainfall on the continent.

Layer 3: Extreme Climates



The Latitude Span

The continent extends to within 10° of both the equator and the North Pole, embracing every climatic zone from permanent ice caps to tropical rainforests.

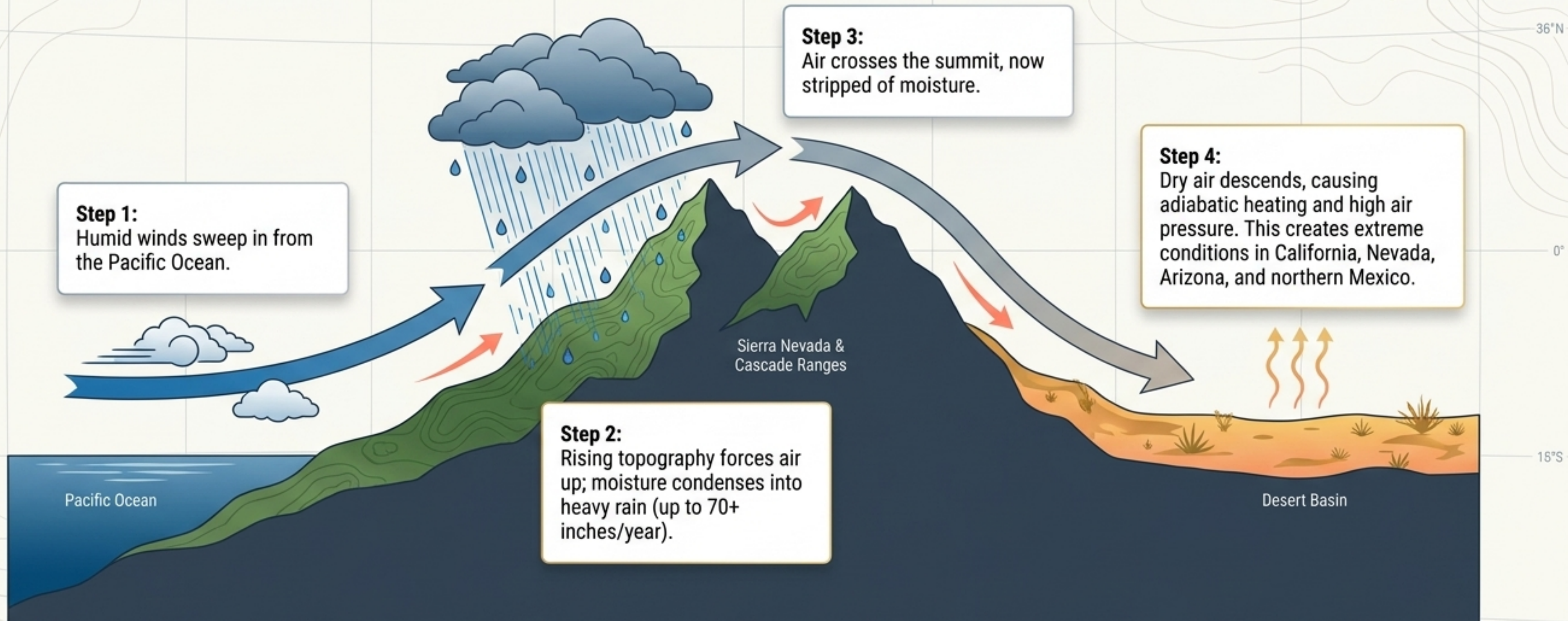

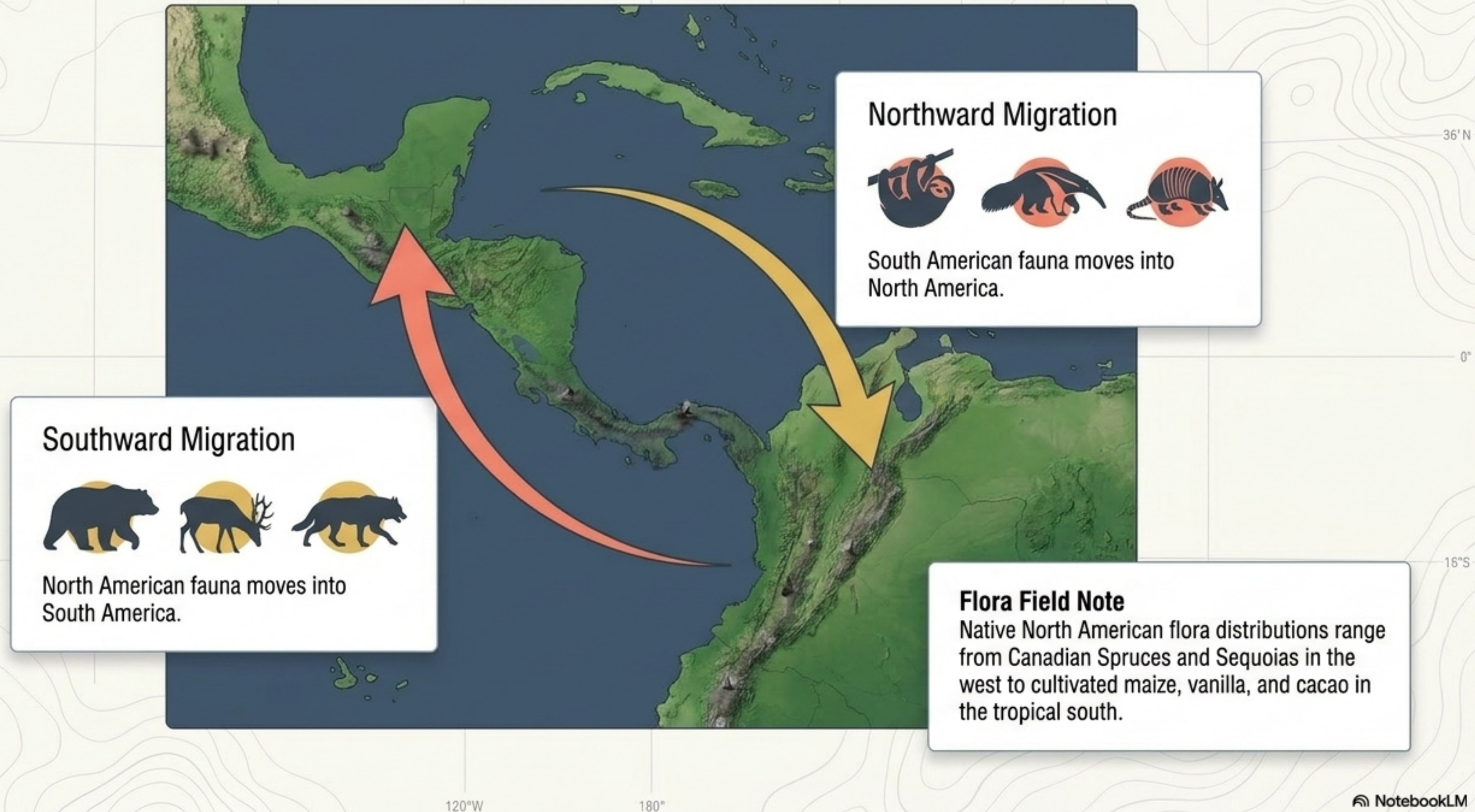


Calculated modern center: Center, North Dakota.

Pre-Contact (40K–12K Years Ago)

Humans migrate from Asia across the exposed Bering Land Bridge, caused by lowered sea levels during the last glacial period.

Hundreds of indigenous groups subsequently develop extensive trade networks and unique agriculture across the continent.

Colonialism (Late 1400s+)

European settlers arrive (Spain, Portugal, France, Britain). This era is marked by the devastating impact of introduced diseases (smallpox) on indigenous populations and the brutal introduction of the transatlantic slave trade until 1865.

Contemporary Era

The continent reaches a massive population of 596 million people living across 23 independent nations. English, Spanish, and French emerge as the dominant macro-languages.

Layer 5: The Three Geopolitical Realms



The Northern Mass

3 massive, highly populated countries making up the vast majority of the continent's land mass and economic output.



The Central Isthmus

7 contiguous countries forming the critical land bridge between North and South America.



The Caribbean Archipelago

13 independent island nations (plus numerous territories) clustered densely in the Caribbean Sea.

Realm 1: The Northern Mass



Canada

Capital: **Ottawa** | Population: **35M**

Fact: Holds the longest uninterrupted coastline in the world. Stretches to the North Pole.



United States

Capital: **Washington, D.C.** | Population: **321M**

Fact: Currently the world's largest economy. Includes detached states (Alaska, Hawaii) and territories (Puerto Rico).



Mexico

Capital: **Mexico City** | Population: **121M**

Fact: Site of the Chicxulub crater (dinosaur extinction meteorite). Features long plateaus bordered by the Sierra Madre ranges.

Realm 2: The Central Isthmus

Field Note
Belize (Belmopan) | Caribbean coastline, noted for Mayan ruins.

Field Note
Guatemala (Guatemala City, 16M pop) | Most UNESCO World Heritage Sites

Field Note
El Salvador (San Salvador) | Most densely populated North American country.

Field Note
Honduras (Tegucigalpa) | Gained independence in 1821.



Field Note
Nicaragua (Managua) | The largest country by land area in Central America.

Field Note
Costa Rica (San Jose) | Coasts on both Pacific and Caribbean.

Field Note
Panama (Panama City) | Southernmost nation. Home to the Panama Canal, and hosts more bird species than the continental US.

Realm 3: The Caribbean Archipelago

The Giants

Cuba: Havana, 11M pop, largest island, half its plant species are endemic.

Hispaniola: Shared by Haiti (Port-Au-Prince) & Dominican Republic (Santo Domingo, home to the Americas' oldest university).

The Milestones

Jamaica: Kingston, first Caribbean country to gain independence in 1962.

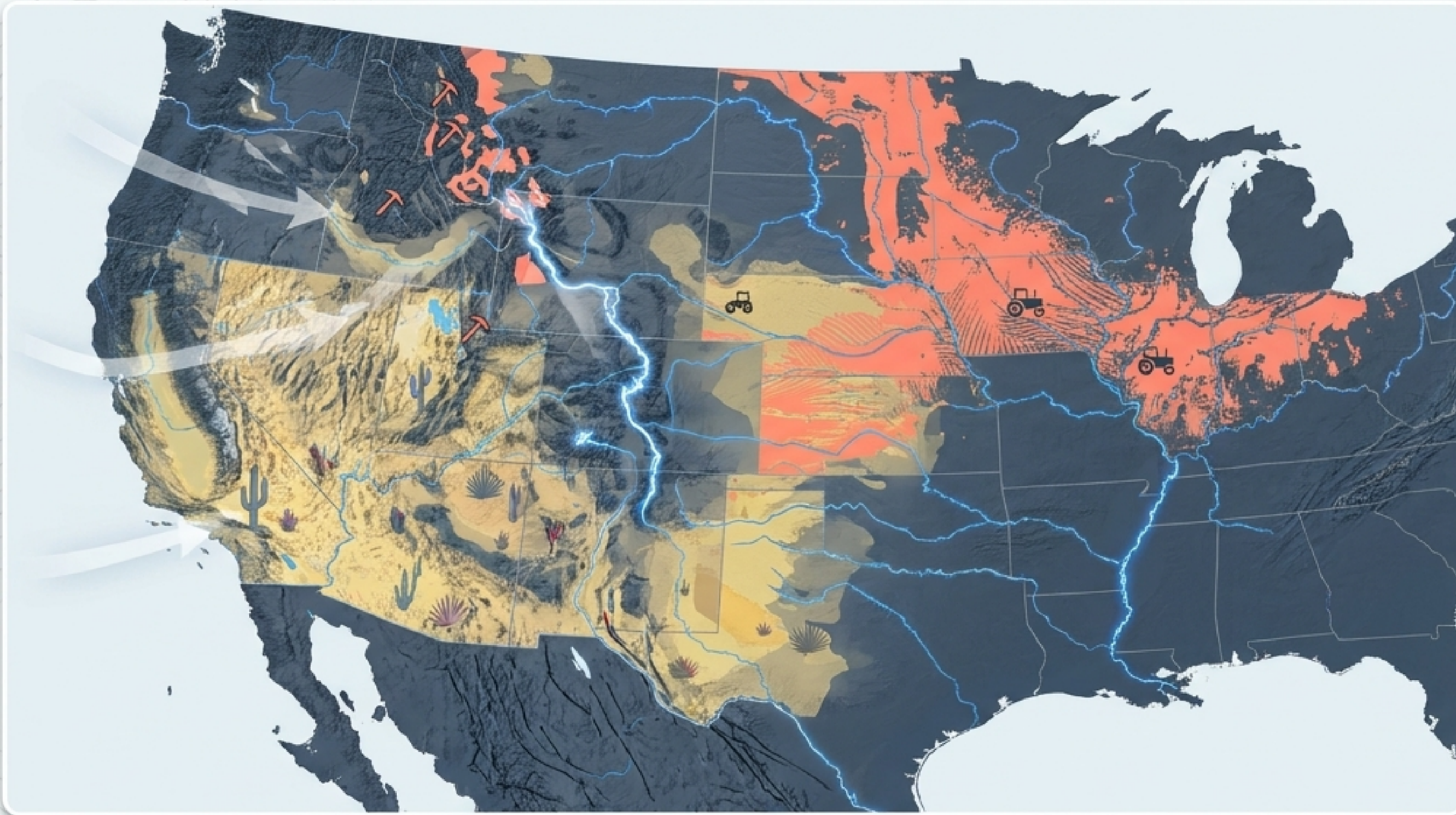
Barbados: Bridgetown, independent from Britain in 1966.

The Micro-States

Saint Kitts and Nevis: Basseterre, smallest NA country by area and population at 55k.

Antigua and Barbuda: Saint John's, features zero rivers or lakes.

The Interconnected Continent



Causal Chain

1. Geology Layer

Tectonic compression creates the Rocky Mountains.

2. Hydrography Layer

The peaks host the Continental Divide, dictating all river flow.

3. Climate Layer

The immense height of the Cordillera casts a massive Rain Shadow.

4. Biosphere Layer

The lack of rain creates the harsh Southwestern Deserts (cacti, yucca).

5. Anthropocene Layer

This arid geography concentrates Mining Operations in the Rockies while forcing Agriculture into the wetter Great Plains.
